The Master in Psychology: Psychological Intervention enables students to acquire professional knowledge and develop professional skills in the field of psychological intervention. Students develop their skills in both basic and applied aspects of psychological intervention research and gain professional experience through an internship and lab work. Students learn to think critically about current psychological issues.

The programme combines different areas of application of psychological intervention and offers students intensive preparation for a career in psychological intervention and research:

- · clinical psychology, including both mental disorders in adults and children, interviewing and intervention techniques
- health psychology, focusing on theoretical aspects of health promotion, health risks as well as methods to assess psychological and biological indicators relevant to health
- · other areas of applied psychology, including (among others) media psychology, cultural psychology and school psychology

Career perspectives

After a successful completion of the programme, graduates have excellent career opportunities, especially, in the field of clinical psychology, health psychology, educational psychology and other fields of intervention, as well as in research. Graduates holding a very good degree may apply for doctoral studies and enrol in the Faculty's Doctoral School or in the Master in Psychotherapy.

Programme objectives and structure

Students will acquire professional skills in assessment and intervention as well as practical research knowledge.

The curriculum is organised into four parts:

- 1. Research-based methodological training (3 modules, 36 ECTS)
- · research methods
- · psychological assessment
- · intervention methods
- 2. Theory-based training in different fields of applied psychology (3 modules, 36 ECTS)
- · clinical psychology
- · health psychology
- · applied psychology

Students can select four out of six courses offered in this module.

- 3. Practical work experience (internship, 1 module, 18 ECTS)
- 4. Master thesis (empirical, 1 module, 30 ECTS)

Programme organisation

The courses are taught in seminars and workshops and are assessed via written submissions, examinations and presentations. Students will complete both an internship of at least three months and a research project consisting of a master thesis, to be submitted at the end of the two-year programme.

Admission to the study programme is based on the submitted documents (including a letter of motivation) and is limited to 25 students per year. The minimum requirement for application is also a final grade of 16 points according to the Luxembourg grading system or a grade of "good" from previous studies. The Admissions Committee reserves the right to invite applicants to an individual interview.
