

Welcome to the Bachelor en Cultures Européennes


We are delighted to welcome you to your semester abroad in the Bachelor en Cultures Européennes (BCE) at the University of Luxembourg. The BCE is an interdisciplinary programme that brings together students and staff from different fields of study, such as History, Philosophy, German (Germanistik), French (Etudes françaises), Lëtzebuerger Linguistik a Literatur (Luxembourgish Linguistics and Literature) or English Studies. In this sense, your exchange is more than a classic exchange: if you wish to, you can decide to choose courses from other disciplines and to expand the scope of your degree by exploring interdisciplinary approaches to European cultures and various perspectives on Europe. Before you do so, please make sure you check whether your home university will validate and credit these courses!

The BCE's **multilingual spirit and structure** echo prevailing language practices in Luxembourg, where a variety of languages are used alongside the national language, Luxembourgish. In the BCE, most courses are taught in German, French, or English, or in various combinations thereof, but we also have courses that are taught in Luxembourgish (Luxembourgish literatures and culture), and we offer introductions to Italian, Portuguese literatures and cultures (taught in French). In keeping with its multilingual character and approach, the BCE promotes **diversity and interdisciplinarity**. Indeed, we encourage our students to venture beyond the scope of their main field and to acquire both disciplinary and interdisciplinary skills. This applies to you too, while you are studying with us, and if you are interested in speaking other languages, don't hesitate and don't worry about 'making mistakes' in general conversations or in class discussions! We all do, but we are interested in exchanging ideas and perspective. Don't let language get in the way!

We encourage you to make the most of this exceptional opportunity and to supplement your disciplinary training with the diverse perspectives to be gained from our varied and wide-ranging offer of interdisciplinary courses.

We wish you a good semester at the University of Luxembourg and every success in your studies.




Before you choose your courses

1. Please note that **some of the information contained in this catalogue might be subject to slight changes** at the beginning of the semester in September 2024, and that some of the courses you choose may no longer be on offer. Should this be the case, you will be able to update your learning agreement.
2. Make sure to read the course descriptions on the [University Website](#).
3. Make sure you check the schedules – you do not want to enrol in two classes taking place at the same time.
4. **Make sure you check the language requirements for each course.** We want you to enjoy your stay at the University of Luxembourg, and in this context, language matters. Enrolling in classes for which you do not have the necessary language skills can cause complications.
5. **Some of our courses are bi- or trilingual.** If more than one language is listed, the course will be taught in a combination of those languages. In some cases, assessment tasks may be submitted in another language, but this depends on course requirements.
6. **We reserve places for incoming exchange students, but the number of places available in our courses is limited.** Make sure you check our course catalogue for alternatives. You will be able to update your learning agreement once your course enrolment has been finalised.

Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR)

Getting used to a new academic setting is both exciting and demanding, and one of the challenges you may encounter relates to language requirements. The [Common European Framework of Reference for Languages](#) can help you to evaluate your own language skills and the competences you will need to complete our courses.

Proficient User	C2	Can understand with ease virtually everything heard or read. Can summarise information from different spoken and written sources, reconstructing arguments and accounts in a coherent presentation. Can express him/herself spontaneously, very fluently and precisely, differentiating finer shades of meaning even in more complex situations.
	C1	Can understand a wide range of demanding, longer texts, and recognise implicit meaning. Can express him/herself fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching for expressions. Can use language flexibly and effectively for social, academic and professional purposes. Can produce clear, well-structured, detailed text on complex subjects, showing controlled use of organisational patterns, connectors and cohesive devices.
Independent User	B2	Can understand the main ideas of complex text on both concrete and abstract topics, including technical discussions in his/her field of specialisation. Can interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible without strain for either party. Can produce clear, detailed text on a wide range of subjects and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options.
	B1	Can understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc. Can deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling in an area where the language is spoken. Can produce simple connected text on topics which are familiar or of personal interest. Can describe experiences and events, dreams, hopes & ambitions and briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.
Basic User	A2	Can understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment). Can communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters. Can describe in simple terms aspects of his/her background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need.
	A1	Can understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type. Can introduce him/herself and others and can ask and answer questions about personal details such as where he/she lives, people he/she knows and things he/she has. Can interact in a simple way provided the other person talks slowly and clearly and is prepared to help.
