


## Coding tree and Visualisation



## Codebook

### L2: The Future of borders

- L1: Overcoming Borders
  - o **Relevance:** This code shows the idea that humans try and succeed in overcoming borders, whether those borders are physical, political, or metaphorical.
- L1: Political borders
  - o **Relevance:** This code signifies that borders are often political: separating political entities from one another.

- L1: Constructed borders
  - **Relevance:** This code shows the border scholar's view that borders are not natural, but are constructed by people.
- L1: Borders as a space for reflection
  - **Relevance:** The border scholar points out that being at a border makes people reflect on themselves, on their own identity, and their culture.
- L1: Localised borders
  - **Relevance:** Borders divide not only nations and nations state, they also exist on a much smaller scale, for example within cities and neighbourhoods.
- L1: Borders as connectors
  - **Relevance:** Borders are not only spaces that divide and separate, but according to the border scholar, borders also serve as spaces where people connect.
- L1: What makes a nation
  - **Relevance:** Throughout this interview, the border scholar brings the question of what constitutes a nation to the forefront.
- L1: The role of corporations in the future of borders
  - **Relevance:** This code shows that the border scholar contemplates the various aspects of what the future of borders might involve, including the role of corporations.
- L1: Migration
  - **Relevance:** As with the other interviews, the topic of migration is mentioned in this interview, and that is signified by this code.
- L1: Gaming and online communities
  - **Relevance:** This code shows that the border scholar contemplates the role of gaming communities and online communities in the future of borders.
- L1: Borders in history
  - **Relevance:** This code refers to a specific passage where the border scholar talks about how borders have changed and been used throughout some of history.
- L1: Nations and borders
  - **Relevance:** This code examines the close link between nations and borders, as mentioned several times in this interview, and as also mentioned by *Amigod*.
